


Our next exciting event is the 5th

The Road, by Cormac McCarthy

There's a reason this won Pulitzer for 73-year-old McCarthy. The topic of this sparse novel, about a father and son in post-apocalyptic America, might not be everyone's cup of tea, but if it is, you're in for something remarkable.

Thirteen Moons, by Charles Frazier. I think I enjoyed this in subsequent moments of unexpected thought even more than when I was reading it. Frazier has a knack for hitting you subtly when you didn't even realize it. His main character, Will, sneaks up on you until you want to call him friend—I think because Frazier knows how to get under your skin in how he shares the joys and sorrows of living the human condition.


